PROGRAM FORMAT

The first day of the Congress (Wednesday 27 November) will be devoted to a number of half-day pre-Congress workshops, including Professor Simpson's and Dr Wilson's.

Keynote and invited addresses, paper sessions and posters will fill the remaining 2.5 days, the Congress finishing at lunch time on the Saturday.

- When Colonel Light founded Adelaide in 1836 we became Australia's first freely settled colony.
- We exported Australia's first wine in 1845.
- Our women were the first to enjoy voting rights and right to stand for parliament. The state government was the first to pass sex discrimination legislation.
- Sir Douglas Nicholls was the first Aboriginal to become a State Governor.
- Adelaide was the first Australian city to put on an arts festival.
- Land rights were another Adelaide first. The early settlers recognised the Kaurna people as Adelaide's original inhabitants.

Keynote Speakers



Professor Ian Freckelton

lan Freckelton is a Senior Counsel at the Bars of Victoria and Tasmania. His work is principally in the administrative, personal injury and criminal law

areas at both trial and appellate levels. He appears regularly for regulatory boards in disciplinary cases involving health practitioners and has appeared in many of Australia's best known coronial inquests. Between 2008 and 2013 Ian was also a part-time Professor of Law, Forensic Psychology and Forensic Medicine at Monash University. In 2013 he was appointed a Professorial Fellow in Law and Psychiatry at the University of Melbourne. He has been a member of 10 tribunals, including the Mental Health Review Board for the last 17 years. He is a former transnational and Victorian President of ANZAPPL and is an honorary life member. He is the Editor-in-Chief of Psychiatry, Psychology and Law and the Editor of the Journal of Law and Medicine. Ian is an elected member of the Academy of Social Sciences Australia and of the Australian Academy of Law. He has written very extensively on mental health and the law issues and is the author and editor of some 40 books and over 500 peer reviewed articles and chapters. His most recent books, all published during 2013, are the 5th edition of Expert Evidence: Law, Practice, Procedure and Advocacy (with Hugh Selby), Coercive Care: Rights, Law and Policy (with Bernadette McSherry) and Scholarly Misconduct and the Law.



Chief Justice Chris Kourakis

The Honourable Justice Kourakis was admitted to practice in 1982. Some of his career highlights include:

- Articled at Johnston Withers McCusker
- Worked at the Legal Services Commission for several years then at a suburban practice before going to the Bar in 1989
- Legal Services Commissioner 1993-1997
- Took silk in 1997
- President of the Law Society 2001
- Appointed as Solicitor-General for the State of South Australia on 3 February 2003
- Appointed to the bench of the Supreme Court of South Australia 21 August 2008
- Appointed as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of South Australia on 25 June 2012.



Professor Sandy Simpson

Dr. Simpson is Associate Professor and Head of the Division of Forensic Psychiatry of the Department of Psychiatry, University of Toronto and is

Chief of Forensic Psychiatry and Clinical Scientist, Clinical Research Program at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health. Toronto.

He previously served as the Clinical Director and Director of Area Mental Health Services of the Auckland Regional Forensic Psychiatry Service and was Honorary Clinical Associate Professor at the University of Auckland. New Zealand.

He has extensive experience in service development, recovery and cross cultural forensic mental health care. He has provided advice to government agencies and services on policy and has worked closely with the judiciary and legal community

Dr. Simpson has a broad teaching experience including post-graduate university teaching in Forensic Psychiatry and specialist training for the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists, and is involved in the development of sub-specialty training in Forensic Psychiatry in Toronto

He has authored or co-authored over 80 peer reviewed articles and book chapters covering topics including clinical assessment, prevention and management of violence risk in forensic populations, to the issues of mental health treatment needs of prison inmates. Dr. Simpson's current areas of research are in models of prison mental health service delivery, risk assessment and rehabilitation models, epidemiology of mental illness and service responses and aspects of mental health law.

He is a member of the Advisory Board of the International Association of Forensic Mental Health Services, is Secretary of the Canadian Academy of Psychiatry and Law and is a member of the American Academy of Psychiatry and Law Cross Cultural Committee. He is a member of the Psychiatry and Law Committee for the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry. He is a member of the Editorial Board of Criminal Behaviour and Mental Health.





Dr Nick Wilson

Nick Wilson, PhD., PG Dip. Psych.(Clinical) has been working as a Clinical Psychologist for the New Zealand Department of Corrections for the last

seventeen years. His current role is as the National Advisor, Psychological Research with responsibility for the provision of specialist training, expert witness testimony, and research in the area of risk assessment and offender management and treatment. Nick has a long standing interest in criminal psychopathy, its assessment and treatment and has carried out research and provided clinical services and training in this area since 2000. He has also carried out extensive research into the area of risk assessment with youth and adult offenders, with violent and sex offences. Nick has been involved in the development and evaluation of a wide range of Corrections treatment programmes delivered to offenders, most recently rapist and violent psychopath treatment, and initiatives to address prison staff safety. Nick in recent years has been focused on how to bring about an across Corrections approach to create and manage crime desistance pathways. This focus has involved the development of simple complementary dynamic risk and protective asset assessment measures for use by probation officers and by staff involved in prison based case management.



Senator Penny Wright

Senator Penny Wright was elected to the Senate at the 2010 Federal election and took her seat on July 1, 2011.

She is a proud member of the Australian Greens in parliament and works hard on behalf of people at home in South Australia and throughout the nation.
